Kenny Atkinson was named as the 21st head coach in the Brooklyn Nets' NBA history on April 17, 2016.

Atkinson joined the Nets after spending the past four seasons as an assistant coach with the Atlanta Hawks under head coach Mike Budenholzer. The Hawks made playoff appearances in each of Atkinson's four seasons, including the club's first-ever trip to the Eastern Conference Finals in 2014-15. The 2014-15 Hawks registered a franchise-record 60 wins, including a franchise-best 19-game win streak, and captured their first division title in more than 20 years. Atkinson served on the 2015 Eastern Conference All-Star coaching staff, and he guided Team World in the BBVA Compass Rising Stars Challenge during All-Star weekend in New York. Prior to his tenure with the Hawks, Atkinson was an assistant coach for four seasons with the New York Knicks (2008-12), helping the team reach the postseason in 2011 and 2012. Atkinson also spent one season as the director of player development for the Houston Rockets (2007-08).

A native of Northport, N.Y., Atkinson has also held various coaching positions abroad, serving as director of player development/assistant coach for Paris Basket Racing Club in France (2004-06), director of player development/assistant coach for the national team of the Republic of Georgia in the summer of 2006 and as an assistant coach with the Ukraine national team at the European championships in 2011. Most recently, Atkinson was head coach of the Dominican Republic national team in the 2015 FIBA Americas Championship in Mexico City.

Prior to beginning his coaching career, Atkinson played professionally for 14 years (1990-2004), beginning his pro career in the CBA and USBL before competing for teams in France, Germany, Italy, Netherlands and Spain. A standout collegiate player at the University of Richmond, Atkinson earned All-CAA First Team honors as a junior and senior and helped lead the Spiders to a Sweet 16 appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 1988. He was also selected as the 1987 CAA Rookie of the Year.

Scott Brooks joined the Washington Wizards after serving as the Oklahoma City Thunder's head coach for seven seasons (2008-09 through 2014-15). With Brooks at the helm, the Thunder amassed a 338-207 (.620) record, tallied four seasons with at least 50 wins (including 60 wins in 2012-13), made three appearances in the Western Conference Finals (2011, 2012, 2014) and advanced to the 2012 NBA Finals.

Brooks was named the 2009-10 NBA Coach of the Year after guiding OKC to a 50-32 record in his first full season as head coach and leading the team to a 27-win improvement. He also was twice named as head coach for the Western Conference All-Star team (2012 and 2014). Brooks was originally promoted to head coach of the Thunder on April 15, 2009, after being named interim head coach on Nov. 22, 2008.

Before joining the Thunder (then Seattle SuperSonics) organization as an assistant prior to the 2007-08 season, Brooks spent the 2006-07 season working as an assistant coach with the Sacramento Kings. His NBA coaching career began with the Denver Nuggets, where he served as an assistant coach from 2003-06. Brooks helped lead the Nuggets to the playoffs in each of his three seasons on the bench, with the team compiling a 136-110 (.560) regular-season record. In 2000, Brooks was a player/assistant coach with the Los Angeles Stars of the ABA. The following season, he served as the head coach of the Southern California Surf of the ABA, guiding the club to a 23-14 record.

A native of Lathrop, Calif., Brooks played 10 seasons in the NBA, appearing in 680 regular-season games with Philadelphia, Minnesota, Houston, Dallas, New York and Cleveland. He won an NBA championship in 1994 as a member of the Houston Rockets. The 5-11 guard retired with career averages of 4.9 points and 2.4 assists.

Brett Brown was named head coach of the Philadelphia 76ers on Aug. 14, 2013, after spending the previous seven seasons as an assistant coach on Gregg Popovich's staff in San Antonio.

Brown originally joined the Spurs as a member of their basketball operations department in 1998-99 but left after the season to become the head coach of the Sydney Kings of the Australian National Basketball League (NBL). He rejoined the Spurs in July 2002 as the team's assistant coach/director of player development and was moved to the bench as an assistant coach prior to the 2006-07 season. Brown was with the Spurs for their first four championships (1999, 2003, 2005 and 2007).

In March 2009, Brown was named head coach of the Australian National Team. He had previously served as an assistant for eight years, including both the 1996 and 2000 Olympic Games as well as the 1998 World Championships.

A native of Maine, Brown played at South Portland High School for his father, Bob Brown, who is a New England Basketball Hall of Famer. The younger Brown went on to attend Boston University, where he played under Rick Pitino. Brown was named team MVP his sophomore year and served as team captain his final two seasons, helping the Terriers reach the NCAA Tournament as a senior in 1983. Brown left ranked fourth in school history in assists (404). In 2013, Brown joined his father as an inductee into the New England Basketball Hall of Fame.

BUDENHOLZER, MIKE

HAWKS

Mike Budenholzer was named the 12th full-time head coach in Atlanta Hawks history on May 28, 2013. He added duties as President of Basketball Operations on June 30, 2015.

Budenholzer spent 19 seasons with the San Antonio Spurs. He worked the final 17 as an assistant coach and the last six as the No. 1 aide to Gregg Popovich, the longest-tenured head coach in major professional sports.

As an assistant coach beginning with the 1996-97 season, he helped lead San Antonio to a league-best 908-438 (.675) regular-season record, a league-best 133-83 playoff mark (.616) and NBA championships in 1999, 2003, 2005 and 2007. Hired by Popovich prior to the 1994-95 campaign, Budenholzer spent his first two seasons as a video coordinator before being named an assistant coach. On numerous occasions, he served as the Spurs' summer league head coach. He also served as an advance scout for Team USA for the 2004 Athens Olympics.

Budenholzer is a 1993 graduate of Pomona College, where he received a bachelor's degree in politics, philosophy and economics, and was a four-year letterman in both basketball and golf. Following college, he played professionally in Denmark for the Vejle Basketball Klub. He also got his start in coaching, serving as head coach for two different teams in the Vejle system.

A native of Holbrook, Ariz., he and his wife, Mary Beth, have four children: Will, Libby, Hanna and John. His father, Vince, spent 25 years as a high school and college basketball coach in Arizona before retiring in 1997, and was inducted into the Arizona Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Rick Carlisle is in his ninth season as the head coach of the Dallas Mavericks. He was hired by Dallas in May 2008, and is the third-longest-tenured head coach in the league behind San Antonio's Gregg Popovich (hired in December 1996) and Miami's Erik Spoelstra (April 2008). Carlisle became the all-time winningest coach in Mavericks history with a 103-93 victory at the Los Angeles Lakers on Nov. 1, 2015, passing Don Nelson (339) with win No. 340.

Carlisle has led his team to the playoffs 12 times in his 14 seasons as a head coach. He guided the Mavericks to their first-ever NBA championship in 2011. Carlisle recorded his 500th career win against Portland on Feb. 6, 2013, becoming the 28th coach in NBA history to reach the milestone.

Carlisle was named the ninth Dallas coach in franchise history on May 9, 2008. He joined the Mavericks after spending six seasons with Detroit and Indiana as a head coach. He served as an ESPN studio analyst during the 2007-08 NBA season before coming to Dallas.

A native of Ogdensburg, N.Y., Carlisle began his coaching career in 1989 as an assistant with the New Jersey Nets. In five seasons with the Nets, he worked under coaches Bill Fitch and Chuck Daly. Carlisle then moved on to Portland, where he spent three seasons as an assistant under P.J. Carlesimo before joining former teammate Larry Bird's staff in Indiana during the summer of 1997.

In 1984, Carlisle began his NBA career as the only rookie to make the Boston Celtics' roster. He spent three seasons in Boston and enjoyed his best year as a pro when he averaged 9.9 minutes in 77 games for the 1986 NBA champions. He then played one year with the New York Knicks under head coach Rick Pitino before moving on to New Jersey, where he played briefly for Fitch before being offered an assistant coaching position with the franchise.

CASEY, DWANE

RAPTORS

Dwane Casey was named the eighth head coach in Toronto Raptors history June 21, 2011, joining the organization just nine days after helping lead the Dallas Mavericks to the 2011 NBA championship. Casey, 58, has served as a head coach, associate head coach and assistant coach in the NBA 20 of the past 21 years. He has coached in two NBA Finals (1996 and 2011) and two NBA All-Star Games (1996 and 1998).

Under Casey's leadership, the Raptors have won three consecutive Atlantic Division championships and improved their regular-season win total in each of his five seasons – a first in team history. Casey became the all-time winningest coach in franchise history (157 victories) Nov. 1, 2015, and claimed his 200th career win March 17, 2016. On Jan. 1, 2016, he coached his 346th game with the Raptors, becoming the longest-tenured coach in team history.

In 2015-16, Casey directed the Raptors to their fourth Atlantic Division championship and set a team record with 56 victories. It was the first time in franchise history the Raptors had topped 50 wins in a season. The Raptors finished second in the Eastern Conference, the highest position in franchise history. Casey showed an ability to adapt and succeed as he was missing two-fifths of his starting lineup for more than 60 games and started a rookie for 20 games following the All-Star break.

Toronto is Casey's second stop as an NBA head coach. His first endeavor as a bench boss was with the Minnesota Timberwolves from 2005-07. He had the club in playoff contention with a 20-20 record when he was replaced Jan. 25, 2007. His 2005-06 squad finished in the NBA's top 10 in average points allowed and opponents' field goal percentage.

Casey began his NBA coaching career in 1994 as an assistant with the Seattle SuperSonics. He spent 11 seasons with the Sonics where he served under longtime NBA head coaches George Karl, Paul Westphal and Nate McMillan. He was promoted to associate head coach in November 2000. Nine of his teams in Seattle finished above .500 with five winning 50 or more games. The 1996 squad won the Western Conference championship after finishing the regular season with a franchise-record 64 victories.

Prior to joining the Sonics, Casey spent five years as a head coach in Japan. He also coached Japan's National Team with basketball legend Pete Newell. In the summer of 1998, Casey coached the team to its first World Championship appearance in 31 years. From 1985-89, Casey was an assistant under legendary collegiate coach Eddie Sutton at the University of Kentucky. The Wildcats posted a 90-40 mark during that span. He also served as an assistant under Clem Haskins at Western Kentucky University from 1980-85.

Casey began his coaching career at Kentucky in 1979 as a graduate assistant under Joe B. Hall. While at UK, he recruited and coached eventual NBA players Winston Bennett, Sam Bowie, Rex Chapman, LeRon Ellis, Shawn Kemp, Chris Mills, Dirk Minnifield, Irving Thomas and Melvin Turpin. Casey played collegiately at Kentucky and helped the Wildcats register a 30-2 record in his junior season and capture the 1978 NCAA Championship. A four-year letterman, Casey was named team captain his senior year and won Kentucky's all-academic award.

A native of Morganfield, Ky., Casey earned a degree in business administration from Kentucky in 1979. He and his wife, Brenda, have a daughter, Justine, and a son, Zachary.

Steve Clifford is in his fourth season as head coach after joining the Charlotte Hornets on May 29, 2013.

Clifford has nearly 30 years of coaching experience at the NBA and collegiate level, including 13 seasons as an assistant coach for the New York Knicks, Houston Rockets, Orlando Magic and Los Angeles Lakers. Clifford came to Charlotte after spending the 2012-13 season as an assistant coach for the Lakers, first under Mike Brown and then under Mike D'Antoni. Prior to the Lakers, Clifford spent five seasons as an assistant coach with the Magic from 2007-12. As a member of Stan Van Gundy's staff, he helped the Magic to a 259-135 record (.657) and five straight playoff appearances, including a trip to the 2009 NBA Finals.

Before going to Orlando, Clifford spent four seasons as an assistant coach under Jeff Van Gundy with the Rockets from 2003-07. He began his NBA career with the Knicks, serving as the team's advance scout in 2000-01 before moving to the bench as an assistant coach from 2001-03.

Prior to the NBA, Clifford spent 15 years coaching at the collegiate level, including four years as head coach at Adelphi University in Garden City, N.Y. Clifford posted a record of 86-36 (.705) at Adelphi, leading the school to four straight 20-win seasons and four straight appearances in the NCAA Division II Tournament.

Clifford began his college coaching career at Saint Anselm College in New Hampshire, where he spent four seasons as an assistant coach. He then served as an assistant coach for one year at Fairfield University, four seasons at Boston University and one season at Siena University before becoming the head coach at Adelphi from 1995-99. Clifford also spent one season as an assistant coach at East Carolina University in 1999-2000 before moving to the NBA.

Clifford's first coaching experience came at Woodland High School in Maine, where he coached for two seasons after graduating from the University of Maine at Farmington with a degree in special education. He played four years for the Beavers, being named Best Defensive Player in his final two seasons while serving as team captain.

Mike D'Antoni was named the 13th head coach in Houston Rockets history on May 26, 2016.

D'Antoni has over a quarter of a century of coaching experience. Over a four-season span as head coach of the Phoenix Suns from 2004-05 through 2007-08, he guided the Suns to a record of 232-96 (.707), including back-to-back trips to the Western Conference Finals in 2005 and 2006. In eight seasons as a head coach in Italy, D'Antoni compiled a 288-101 (.740) mark.

In 2004-05, D'Antoni was named NBA Coach of the Year after leading Phoenix to a franchise-high-tying 62 wins in his first full season as head coach. The Suns increased their scoring average by 16.2 points per game over the previous season, marking the largest scoring increase from one season to the next by any team since the introduction of the shot clock in 1954-55.

Hired to become the 24th head coach in Knicks franchise history on May 13, 2008, D'Antoni guided the 2010-11 team to its first winning season since 2000-01 and concluded his four-year tenure in New York as the sixth-winningest coach in team history with a mark of 121-167 (.420). In each of his three full seasons on the Knicks' bench, his teams finished in the top 10 league-wide in scoring (4th in 2009, 9th in 2010 and 2nd in 2011).

D'Antoni also served as head coach of the Los Angeles Lakers for two seasons (2012-14). He guided the Lakers to a 40-32 record in 2012-13 upon being hired after the start of the season. Los Angeles then went 27-55 under D'Antoni in 2013-14.

A dual citizen of the U.S. and Italy, D'Antoni was named one of the 50 Most Influential Personalities in European Club Basketball history by Euroleague Basketball in 2008. He spent parts of four seasons playing in the NBA and ABA during the mid-1970s before embarking on a standout career in the Italian League.

Billy Donovan was named coach of the Oklahoma City Thunder on April 30, 2015.

In 19 years as head coach at the University of Florida, Donovan led the Gators to two national championships and four trips to the Final Four while amassing a record of 467-186 (.715). During his tenure at Florida, Donovan led the program to 16 straight 20-win seasons, three 30-win seasons, 17 consecutive trips to the postseason and six SEC championships. Under Donovan, Florida advanced to the Elite Eight in six of his final 10 seasons.

Donovan concluded his time at Florida with the second-most wins for an SEC program (467) in the history of the conference. Additionally, his 35 NCAA tournament wins rank as the most all time among SEC coaches. Donovan's win total is more than twice that of any other coach in Florida history.

Donovan received numerous collegiate coaching awards, including ESPN.com's National Coach of the Year (2001), the Wooden Award's "Legends of Coaching" Honor (2010) and SEC Coach of the Year (2011, 2013, 2014).

Donovan's coaching experience dates to the 1989-90 season, when he served as a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky. After five years with the Wildcats, Donovan was hired as head coach at Marshall, where he spent two years before leaving for Florida.

Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Donovan enjoyed a four-year playing career at Providence, where he helped lead the Friars to their best season in school history and a trip to the Final Four in 1987. In addition, Donovan appeared in 44 games as a member of the New York Knicks during the 1987-88 season.

David Fizdale was named coach of the Memphis Grizzlies on May 29, 2016.

Fizdale comes to Memphis after spending eight seasons (2008-16) with the Miami Heat, including the last two as the assistant head coach and the previous six as an assistant coach under Erik Spoelstra. During that time, Fizdale's assistance in game preparation, involvement in player development and rapport with the roster played a major role in the Heat's championship success. Dating back to his first season on the Heat sidelines in 2008-09, Miami won more playoff games (70) and playoff series (15) than any team in the NBA and compiled the league's second-best regular-season (.623) and fourth-best postseason (.619) winning percentages.

Before his tenure in Miami, Fizdale spent four seasons (2004-08) as an assistant coach with the Atlanta Hawks, where he was instrumental in the development of their young players. The Hawks increased their win total in each of his final three seasons and in 2007-08 earned the franchise's first postseason appearance since 1999. He began his NBA coaching career as an assistant coach for the Golden State Warriors for one season (2003-04).

Prior to joining the Warriors, Fizdale spent five seasons coaching in the college ranks. After one year (1997-98) in the Heat video department, he started his coaching career as an assistant coach at his alma mater, the University of San Diego. After four seasons (1998-2002) with the Toreros, he spent one season (2002-03) as an assistant coach at Fresno State University.

Alvin Gentry was named the head coach of the New Orleans Pelicans on May 30, 2015, the sixth coach in the franchise's history.

Prior to joining the Pelicans' organization, Gentry served as the associate head coach of the Golden State Warriors, helping navigate the team to one of the best seasons in NBA history. The Warriors won a then franchise-record 67 games in 2014-15 and defeated the Cleveland Cavaliers in the NBA Finals.

Gentry has more than 35 years of coaching experience. Gentry has previously served as the head coach of the Miami Heat (1995), Detroit Pistons (1997-2000), Los Angeles Clippers (2000-2003) and Phoenix Suns (2008-2013). In Detroit, Gentry led the Pistons to the 1999 NBA playoffs during his only full season as head coach of the club. In Los Angeles, Gentry improved the Clippers' record by 16 wins during his first season in 2000-01 (31-51), and added another eight wins the following season (39-43), marking the franchise's best finish in nearly a decade. As head coach of the Suns, Gentry led the team to the 2010 Western Conference Finals after a 54-28 regular-season record – the fourth best in Phoenix franchise history.

Known for his offensive prowess, Gentry's 2009-10 Suns team led the NBA in scoring (110.2 points per game) as well as offensive rating (115.3), and finished fourth in pace of play (95.3), while being the only team in the league to connect on over 40-percent of their three-point field goal attempts (.412). During the 2013-14 season, Gentry served as the associate head coach of the Clippers, where Los Angeles led the league in both scoring (107.9 points per game) and offensive rating (112.1), while also finishing seventh in pace of play (95.9).

A native of Shelby, N.C., Gentry was a college point guard at Appalachian State, where he graduated with a degree in management in 1977 before embarking on a coaching career. He earned his first opportunity as a graduate assistant at the University of Colorado during the 1977-78 season and landed a full-time assistant coaching job at Baylor in 1980 before returning to Colorado as an assistant coach from 1981-85.

In 1985, Gentry joined Larry Brown's staff as an assistant at the University of Kansas, helping the Jayhawks capture the 1988 National Championship and then proceeding to follow Brown to the NBA as an assistant coach on his staff with the San Antonio Spurs. This is Gentry's second stop in New Orleans, as he served as an assistant coach for Tim Floyd's staff during the 2003-04 season.

Gentry and his wife, Suzanne, have two sons, Ryan and Jack. Alvin also has a daughter, Alexis.

Fred Hoiberg was named the 19th head coach in Chicago Bulls history on June 2, 2015.

Hoiberg came to Chicago with a vast amount of experience at the pro and collegiate levels, most recently serving as the head coach at his alma mater, Iowa State. During his five seasons at the helm of the Cyclones program, his teams were nationally ranked on a perennial basis, as they posted a record of 115-56 (.673), highlighted by four consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament (2012-15) and two Big 12 Tournament championships (2014, 2015).

He is the fastest coach to 100 wins in Iowa State history and his 115 wins are the most in a five-year span at the school. The program's four straight appearances in the NCAA Tournament was a first in school history. He oversaw the biggest turnaround in Big 12 history, as the Cyclones improved from 3-13 in conference play in 2010-11 to 12-6 in 2011-12. During his tenure in Ames, his teams posted four straight 20-win seasons. His final two seasons on campus, the Cyclones posted a record of 53-17 (.757). He was named Big 12 Co-Coach of the Year in 2012. From 2012-15, his teams led the Big 12 in scoring with an average of 77.9 ppg, while ranking in the top 10 nationally in two of the seasons.

Prior to his term with the Cyclones program, he worked four seasons in the front office of the Minnesota Timberwolves. As an executive with the Timberwolves, he served as the team's Vice President of Basketball Operations (2009-10) following three seasons as the team's Assistant General Manager (2006-09). As a member of Minnesota's front office, he oversaw the day-to-day operations of basketball programs including college and pro scouting, salary cap management and NBA Draft preparations.

Originally selected by the Indiana Pacers in the second round (52nd overall) of the 1995 NBA Draft, Hoiberg played in 541 regular-season games, where he averaged 5.4 ppg, 2.7 rpg and 1.6 rpg in 18.4 mpg. He was a member of three playoff teams, as he appeared in 24 playoff contests and averaged 5.3 ppg, 3.0 rpg and 1.1 apg in 19.9 mpg. He played for Indiana (1995-99), Chicago (1999-2003) and Minnesota (2003-05) during his 10-year career in the NBA. While with Minnesota in 2004-05, he led the NBA in three-point field goal percentage (.483).

He enjoyed a successful four-year college career at Iowa State, as he averaged 15.8 ppg, 5.9 rpg and 2.8 apg and shot .511 from the field, .400 from downtown and .844 from the free-throw line. Upon the conclusion of his playing days in Ames, he left campus ranked third in scoring with 1,993 points. Among the accolades he received in college include: AP Big Eight Freshman of the Year, Second-Team All-Big Eight, First-Team All-Big Eight and All-American, as well as co-Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year. He had his No. 32 retired by Iowa State in 1997

A native of Ames, Hoiberg, and his wife, Carol, are parents to four children: Paige, Jack and twins Sam and Charlie.

Jeff Hornacek was named head coach of the New York Knicks on June 2, 2016, becoming the 28th coach in the franchise's 70-year history.

Hornacek most recently led the Phoenix Suns as its head coach over parts of three seasons from 2013 through 2016, while engineering a 23-win improvement and a 48-34 record in his first year leading the organization, becoming the runner-up in the 2014 NBA Coach of the Year voting. He became just the third person in NBA history to be named both Player and Coach of the Month over the course of their career (December 1991, December 2013). He concluded his Phoenix coaching career with a 101-112 (.474) overall record.

The Elmhurst, Ill., native began his coaching career as an assistant coach for the Utah Jazz under head coaches Jerry Sloan and Tyrone Corbin from 2010-11 through 2012-13 following an illustrious 14-year playing career. Hornacek averaged 14.5 points and 4.9 assists with Phoenix, Philadelphia and Utah, while his teams qualified for the NBA playoffs 11 times. As a member of the Suns, Hornacek represented the Western Conference in the 1992 NBA All-Star Game in Orlando and is a two-time Three-Point Shootout champion (1998, 2000) as a member of the Jazz. He appeared in 140 career playoff games, including back-to-back appearances in the NBA Finals with the Jazz in 1997 and 1998.

On Nov. 19, 2002, the Jazz retired jersey No. 14 in his honor. Over those 14 seasons, he was under the tutelage of some of the all-time greats including: John MacLeod, Cotton Fitzsimmons, Doug Moe and Jerry Sloan. Hornacek was originally selected in the second round (46th overall) of the 1986 NBA Draft, following a four-year playing career at Iowa State University, where he began as a freshman walk-on.

Dave Joerger was named head coach of the Sacramento Kings on May 9, 2016.

Joerger joined the Kings after spending the previous three years as head coach of the Memphis Grizzlies, where he compiled a 147-99 regular-season mark (.598) and guided the franchise to post-season berths in each of his seasons at the helm. Following three straight 50-win campaigns for the first time in club history (2012-13 thru 2014-15), two under Joerger, Memphis again qualified for the playoffs even after injuries forced the team to dress a league-record 28 players last season. Until then, no NBA team had reached the playoffs utilizing 24 or more athletes on its roster in a single season.

Prior to entering the NBA ranks, Joerger won accolades as one of the most successful minor league coaches in history, piloting five teams to championships in three different basketball leagues from 2000-07. Demonstrating strong player development skills, Joerger sent 18 of his players to the NBA during his time in the minor leagues. By the time he was hired by the Grizzlies as an assistant coach in 2007, Joerger had collected titles in the NBA Development League, CBA (Continental Basketball Association) and IBL (International Basketball League).

A Moorhead State alumnus, Joerger played collegiate basketball and then joined the Dakota Wizards of the IBL as the team's general manager before entering the coaching ranks in 2000. He and his wife, Kara, are the parents of two daughters, Alli and Kiana.

Currently in his third season as head coach of the Golden State Warriors, Steve Kerr engineered the most successful campaign of any first-year coach in NBA history in 2014-15, culminating in the Warriors winning the fourth NBA championship in franchise history and the first in 40 years. En route to the NBA title, which was Kerr's sixth after winning five during his 15-year playing career, he led the Warriors to a then-franchise-record 67 victories, establishing NBA records for most wins and highest winning percentage (67-15, .817) by a rookie head coach.

Kerr followed his inaugural campaign by leading the Warriors to an NBA-record 73 wins in 2015-16, earning NBA Coach of the Year honors in a season where his team eclipsed the previous mark of 72 victories set by a Chicago Bulls squad in 1995-96 that featured Kerr as a key reserve. In addition to the single-season wins record, the Warriors set new league marks for single-season road wins (34), consecutive wins to begin a season (24) and consecutive regular-season home wins (54). After seeing a 16-game improvement over the previous season in 2014-15 (51-31 in 2013-14), an NBA record for the biggest improvement by a 50-win team in league history, the Warriors improved by six wins in 2015-16, joining the Chicago Bulls (1995-96 & 1996-97) as the only teams to win at least 65 games in back-to-back campaigns.

Originally named to the position on May 19, 2014, Kerr is the 25th head coach in franchise history and the 20th since the team moved to the West Coast in 1962. He is the fourth Warriors coach to win an NBA title, joining Eddie Gottlieb (1947), George Senesky (1956) and Alvin Attles (1975).

Kerr owns 27 years of NBA experience as a player, coach, television analyst and front office executive, including a three-year stint (2007-10) as president of basketball operations and general manager for the Phoenix Suns. During his time as the Suns GM, the club posted a 155-91 (.630) record and earned a pair of playoff berths, including a trip to the 2010 Western Conference Finals.

Having made the playoffs 11 times during his playing career, Kerr is one of only 26 players in NBA history to win five championships, earning three rings with Chicago and two with San Antonio. A key reserve for Chicago during the team's three-peat championship run from 1996-98, Kerr famously hit the game-winning, title-clinching shot in Game 6 of the 1997 NBA Finals. He won his fourth consecutive championship in 1999 with the San Antonio Spurs to become one of only two non-Boston Celtics to win four straight NBA titles (joining Frank Saul, 1951-54). His fifth ring came in his second stint with the Spurs during his final NBA campaign in 2002-03.

The NBA's all-time three-point percentage leader, having converted on 45.4 percent (726-of-1599) of his attempts from long range, Kerr amassed career averages of 6.0 points, 1.8 assists and 1.2 rebounds in 910 regular-season games with the Phoenix Suns, Cleveland Cavaliers, Orlando Magic, Chicago Bulls, San Antonio Spurs (twice), and Portland Trail Blazers.

Kerr earned a degree in general studies from Arizona with an emphasis in history, sociology and English in 1988 and serves on the board of directors for Peace Players International, a Washington, D.C.-based organization that uses basketball as a means to bridge cultural gaps in areas of political, racial and religious conflict. He and his wife, Margot, have two sons, Nicholas and Matthew, and one daughter, Madeleine.

Jason Kidd was named the 14th head coach in Milwaukee Bucks history on July 1, 2014, bringing a Hall of Fame résumé compiled over a 19-year playing career to Milwaukee's bench. Kidd previously served as the head coach of the Brooklyn Nets during the 2013-14 season, where he became the first NBA coach in over 30 years to make an immediate transition from NBA player to head coach.

Over his NBA playing career, Kidd posted averages of 12.6 points, 8.7 assists, 6.3 rebounds and 1.93 steals in 1,391 games with Dallas, Phoenix, New Jersey and New York. He ranks second in NBA history in assists (12,091) and steals (2,684).

Kidd's teams advanced to the postseason in 17 of his 19 years as a player, where he appeared in 158 playoff games and averaged 12.9 points, 8.0 assists, 6.7 rebounds and 1.91 steals. He was a member of the 2011 NBA champion Dallas Mavericks, and also made two NBA Finals appearances with the New Jersey Nets in 2002 and 2003. Kidd is also a two-time Olympic gold medalist, leading Team USA in 2000 in Sydney and in 2008 in Beijing.

The former No. 2 pick of the 1994 NBA Draft out of the University of California and Co-Rookie of the Year (Grant Hill), Kidd is a 10-time NBA All-Star (1996, 1998, 2000-04, 2007-08, 2010), a five-time All-NBA First Team selection (1999-02, 2004) and earned All-NBA Second Team honors in 2003. He was named to the NBA's All-Defensive First Team four times (1999, 2001, 2002, 2006) and Second Team five times (2000, 2003-05, 2007). Kidd is a two-time winner (2012 and 2013) of the NBA Sportsmanship Award (Joe Dumars Trophy) as voted by NBA players.

Tyronn Lue was promoted from associate head coach to head coach on Jan. 22, 2016, thus becoming the 20th head coach in franchise history. The Cavs went on to finish the 2015-16 season with the best record in the Eastern Conference (57-25) and the franchise's first-ever NBA championship.

During the 2016 playoffs, Lue became the first head coach in league history to win his first 10 postseason games, as Cleveland would go on to finish a franchise-best 16-5 in its title run. After the Cavaliers defeated Golden State 4-3 in the 2016 NBA Finals, Lue became the fourth-youngest head coach to win an NBA title and just the third coach to win a championship after taking over a team mid-season, joining Pat Riley (2006 and 1982) and Paul Westhead (1980). The Cavaliers also became the first team to overcome a 3-1 deficit in Finals history and the fourth team to win an NBA Finals Game 7 on the road.

Lue originally came to Cleveland as the associate head coach in June 2014. Prior to joining the Cavs, he was an assistant coach on Doc Rivers' staff with the Los Angeles Clippers, who captured the Pacific Division title with a 57-25 record in 2013-14. Before the Clippers, Lue spent four seasons as a member of Rivers' Boston Celtics staff, the last two as an assistant coach. He began his time in Boston as the director of basketball development in 2009-10.

Originally drafted by the Denver Nuggets with the 23rd overall pick in the 1998 NBA Draft, Lue played 11 seasons in the NBA, appearing in 554 career games with the Lakers, Washington, Orlando, Houston, Atlanta, Dallas and Milwaukee. The former University of Nebraska star won NBA championships as a player with the Lakers in 2000 and 2001.

MALONE, MICHAEL

NUGGETS

Michael Malone was named the 16th head coach in the Denver Nuggets' NBA franchise history on June 15, 2015.

Malone possesses over 20 years of coaching experience, 14 coming in the NBA with five different teams prior to the Nuggets – Golden State, New Orleans, Cleveland, New York and Sacramento. The teams that Malone has been a member of the coaching staff have amassed eight playoff appearances, including one NBA Finals showing and two conference finals appearances.

Before joining the Nuggets, Malone served as the head coach of the Sacramento Kings where he posted a record of 39-67 spanning two seasons. Before his time with the Kings, Malone was the lead assistant for the Golden State Warriors under Mark Jackson from 2011-13, when they appeared in the playoffs both seasons. Prior to Golden State, Malone worked as the lead assistant to Monty Williams in New Orleans and helped the Hornets achieve a 46-36 record and a trip to the 2011 NBA playoffs. Malone also served as an assistant coach under Mike Brown for the Cleveland Cavaliers for five seasons, during which the Cavs posted a 272-138 (.663) record, the third-best mark in the NBA over that span. The Cavaliers made five consecutive playoff appearances during Malone's time on the bench, reaching the NBA Finals in 2007 and the Eastern Conference Finals in 2009.

Malone's NBA coaching career began with a four-season stint with the New York Knicks, where he originally joined Jeff Van Gundy's staff as a coaching associate in the summer of 2001, and was promoted to assistant coach in May 2003.

Before joining the NBA, Malone coached seven years in the college ranks, with his last stop coming at Manhattan College, where he was the lead assistant. During the 1998-99 season Malone worked at the University of Virginia as its director of men's basketball administration. Malone also spent three seasons (1995-96 – 1997-98) at Providence College under New York Basketball Hall of Fame coach Pete Gillen after beginning his coaching career working for Greg Kampe at Oakland University in Michigan.

A native of Queens, N.Y., Malone played college basketball at Loyola College in Maryland, where he graduated with a BA degree in 1994. He is a graduate of New Jersey's Seton Hall Prep where he played two years under Bob Farrell. Malone also played a season under Tom Blackburn at Worcester Academy (Mass.).

Malone is the son of longtime NBA coach Brendan Malone. Michael and his wife, Jocelyn, have two daughters, Caitlin and Bridget.

Nate McMillan was named head coach of the Indiana Pacers on May 16, 2016. McMillan had spent the last three seasons as associate head coach for the Pacers under Frank Vogel.

McMillan has a vast basketball background as a player and a coach. After playing collegiately at North Carolina State, McMillan was drafted by Seattle (30th overall) in the 1986 NBA Draft. He played his entire 12-year career with the Sonics and had his number (10) retired. He is second in franchise history in assists and steals and ranks in the top 10 in eight other categories. He was named to the NBA's All-Defensive Team twice (1994 and '95) and led the league in steals in the '94-95 season with 2.96 per game.

After his playing days, McMillan was a Seattle assistant coach for two years and became the interim coach in 2000. He remained the Sonics' coach until 2005 and then became Portland's head coach until he was let go in March, 2012. In 2008-09, he led the Trail Blazers to a 54-28 record, the sixth-best record in franchise history. McMillan compiled a 478-452 (.514) record as a head coach for both teams.

He also served as an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team, where he won gold medals in the 2006 FIBA World Championships, the 2008 Beijing Olympics and the 2012 London Olympics. McMillan was also inducted into the National Junior College Basketball Hall of Fame in 2001 after playing at Chowan College before transferring to North Carolina State.

Gregg Popovich is in his 21st season as the San Antonio Spurs' head coach. He was named the Spurs' head coach in December 1996.

Popovich is the longest-tenured coach with the same team among the 122 NBA, NFL, NHL and MLB franchises. He has led the Spurs to five NBA championships (1999, 2003, 2005, 2007 and 2014). He and Erik Spoelstra are the only two active coaches with multiple NBA titles. He is one of five coaches in history with five or more NBA championships (along with Red Auerbach, Phil Jackson, John Kundla and Pat Riley). Popovich is a three-time NBA Coach of the Year (2003, 2012 and 2014).

Popovich's career winning percentage of .692 ranks third in NBA history (behind Jackson and Billy Cunningham). He ranks eighth in NBA history in career victories and first among active coaches. His 1,089 wins with one team rank second all time behind Jerry Sloan (who amassed 1,127 wins in Utah). Popovich became the ninth head coach in NBA history to record 1,000 career wins with a 95-93 victory at Indiana on Feb. 9, 2015.

His NBA coaching career began in July 1988, when he joined the Spurs as an assistant coach as a member of Larry Brown's staff. He spent the next four seasons in San Antonio with a Spurs team that won a pair of Midwest Division titles. In the summer of 1992, Popovich was named an assistant coach on Don Nelson's staff with the Golden State Warriors. He spent two seasons with the Warriors before returning to San Antonio on May 31, 1994, as the Spurs executive vice president of basketball operations/general manager. Popovich served as GM for eight seasons before turning the job over to R.C. Buford on July 1, 2002. Along with being the head coach, Popovich is currently the president of Spurs basketball.

Doc Rivers is in his fourth season as the LA Clippers' head coach. He is one of only six active NBA head coaches to win an NBA title and was named NBA Coach of the Year in 2000.

Before joining the Clippers, Rivers spent nine seasons with the Celtics, compiling a 416-305 (.576) record and leading the Celtics to the 2007-08 NBA championship with an NBA-best 66-16 regular-season record. Rivers led the Celtics to six Atlantic Division titles, the 2009-10 Eastern Conference championship and a 59-47 (.556) playoff record.

Rivers played 13 seasons in the NBA for the Atlanta Hawks (1983-91), Clippers (1991-92), New York Knicks (1992-94) and San Antonio Spurs (1994-96). On June 7, 2014, Quin Snyder was named the eighth head coach in Utah Jazz history and the fifth since the franchise's relocation to Utah in 1979.

Snyder possesses a diverse coaching background that spans more than two decades in the NBA, Europe, the NBA Development League and college, including 10 years of experience as a head coach. From 2007-10, Snyder served as the first head coach of the San Antonio Spurs-owned/operated Austin Spurs of the NBA Development League, where he recorded a 94-56 (.627) mark, while leading the club to playoff appearances in all three seasons and advancing to at least the NBA D-League Semifinals each year.

His first head coaching position came at the University of Missouri. Snyder was named Rookie Coach of the Year by the Basketball Times after his first season. In seven seasons (1999-2006), he led the Tigers to a 126-91 (.580) record and four NCAA Tournaments, including an Elite Eight appearance in 2002.

Snyder was the lead assistant coach for the Atlanta Hawks in 2013-14 under Mike Budenholzer, helping the Hawks to a 2014 playoff appearance. He has also served as the associate head coach with CSKA Moscow (2012-13) for Ettore Messina, advancing to the 2013 Euroleague Final Four, and worked as an assistant coach with the Los Angeles Lakers in 2011-12 under Mike Brown, and as an assistant on Doug Collins' staff with the Philadelphia 76ers in 2010-11, helping both teams to the NBA playoffs.

Prior to being hired as head coach at Missouri, Snyder served as associate head coach to Mike Krzyzewski at Duke from 1993-99, and as an assistant for Larry Brown with the 1992-93 Los Angeles Clippers.

Born in Mercer Island, Wash., Snyder was a two-time Washington player of the year and a McDonald's All-American. He played collegiately at Duke (1985-89), appearing in 136 games for the Blue Devils and reaching three Final Fours. He was elected as a team captain and honored as an Academic All-American during his senior season. Snyder earned undergraduate degrees in both philosophy and political science from Duke, later earning a Juris Doctor and M.B.A. from Duke as well.

Erik Spoelstra is in his ninth season as head coach of the Miami Heat and his 22nd as a member of the organization. He was elevated to his current position on April 28, 2008.

As head coach, Spoelstra has led the Heat to seven postseason appearances, five division titles, four conference championships and two NBA titles (2012 and 2013). He holds the postseason franchise records in victories (70), winning percentage (.619), series won (15) and postseason games coached (113). In regular-season play, he finished this past season ranked first in winning percentage (.623) on Miami's all-time list and second in victories (399) and games coached (640).

Before taking over as the sixth head coach in Heat history, Spoelstra served Miami in a number of roles in his first 13 years. He was originally hired as video coordinator and over the years was promoted to assistant coach/video coordinator, assistant coach/advance scout and assistant coach/director of scouting before ascending to head coach. He made a name for himself around the league with his game preparation and superb attention to detail. In his seven seasons as the Heat's assistant coach/director of scouting, he had the primary role of developing game plans for upcoming opponents.

In 1992, he graduated from the University of Portland with a degree in communications. While attending Portland, Spoelstra was the starting point guard for four years and was named the West Coast Conference Freshman of the Year in 1989. Upon graduating he spent two years as a player/coach for Tus Herten, a professional team in Germany.

Brad Stevens was named the 17th head coach in the history of the Boston Celtics on July 3, 2013. He has led the Celtics to the playoffs in two of his three seasons at the helm.

Stevens joined the Celtics after coaching Butler University, where he boasted a 166-49 record, four league regular-season championships, three league tournament titles and six trips to post-season tournament play. He has the top two single-season win totals in Butler and Horizon League history, and he became the only coach in school history to lead a team to the NCAA Division I national championship game, which he did twice.

Stevens owns two Horizon League Coach of the Year awards and has rewritten the NCAA record book for Best Coaching Starts by Wins. During the 2012-13 season, he moved into the top spot on the six-year list with 165 victories. He captured the five-year record (139), moving ahead of Everett Case of North Carolina State (1947-51) in 2011-12, and he owns the three-year (89) and four-year (117) records. He is second on the two-year list with 56 wins.

Stevens left a position as a marketing associate at Eli Lilly and Company in Indianapolis to pursue a career in basketball coaching. He served in a volunteer capacity in Butler's basketball office during the summer of 2000, before eventually gaining a full-time administrative position under Thad Matta. Stevens joined the Bulldogs' staff in 2000-01 as coordinator of basketball operations, handling a variety of administrative duties. He was offered a full-time assistant coaching position by Todd Lickliter in 2001-02. Stevens worked with Lickliter for six seasons spanning from 2001-07.

The Indiana native earned a B.A. degree in economics from DePauw in 1999. He was a four-year member of the basketball team at DePauw, earning the squad's "Coaches Award" in 1998-99. He and his wife, Tracy, have two children, son Brady and daughter Kinsley.

The Portland Trail Blazers introduced Terry Stotts as the franchise's 14th head coach on Aug. 7, 2012. He has led the Trail Blazers to the playoffs in three of his four seasons at the helm.

Prior to coming to Portland, Stotts served as an assistant coach with Dallas for four seasons from 2008-12. Under head coach Rick Carlisle, he helped lead the Mavericks to the 2011 NBA championship, playoff berths in each of his four seasons and a 198-114 (.635) overall record.

Stotts has twice before served as an NBA head coach, with two-year stints in both Milwaukee (2005-07) and Atlanta (2002-04). During his two seasons with Milwaukee, Stotts guided the Bucks to a 63-83 (.432) mark, including a playoff appearance in 2006. Stotts replaced Lon Kruger as head coach of the Hawks on Dec. 26, 2002, and accumulated a record of 52-85 (.380) in two seasons with Atlanta.

In between head coaching positions, Stotts worked as the lead assistant to Mike Montgomery at Golden State during the 2004-05 season. Stotts took a sabbatical year in 2007-08, when he served as an NBA Development League coaches consultant, took a 19-day trip to Europe to spend time with top European coaches, attended games and practices at all levels and participated in a number of clinics and camps.

Before becoming a head coach, Stotts served as an assistant under George Karl for 10 years, six with Seattle and four with Milwaukee. Those teams finished each season with a .500 record or better and reached the postseason in nine of 10 seasons. While in Seattle, the Sonics posted a 357-135 (.726) record, captured four Pacific Division titles, reached the Western Conference Finals twice and appeared in the 1996 NBA Finals. In four seasons as lead assistant in Milwaukee, Stotts helped the Bucks amass a 163-133 (.551) mark, highlighted by a Central Division championship and a berth in the 2001 Eastern Conference Finals.

Stotts was selected by Houston in the second round of the 1980 NBA Draft, and played professionally in Italy and then with the CBA's Montana Golden Nuggets, coached by Karl. He returned to Europe in 1983, playing in Spain and France before joining Karl's coaching staff with the CBA's Albany Patroons in 1990-91. During his first year on a professional coaching staff, he helped lead the Patroons to an all-time CBA-best 50-6 record. Stotts was an assistant coach for the CBA's Fort Wayne Fury for one season before joining the Sonics as a scout.

A four-year starter at the University of Oklahoma, Stotts earned All-Big Eight honors as a senior and was named Academic All-America in each of his final two collegiate seasons. He was named Oklahoma's outstanding senior student-athlete and was one of three individuals chosen nationally to receive an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship. He earned a BS in Zoology and, in 1988, earned an MBA from his alma mater.

A native of Cedar Falls, Iowa, Stotts grew up in Iowa, Illinois, Wisconsin, Guam and finished high school in Bloomington, Ind. Stotts is married to his wife, Jan.

Tom Thibodeau was named President of Basketball Operations and head coach of the Minnesota Timberwolves on April 20, 2016.

A veteran of over 25 seasons as an NBA head coach and assistant coach, Thibodeau's teams have advanced to the postseason in 19 seasons, including three trips to the NBA Finals (1999, 2008, 2010). Most recently, Thibodeau was head coach of the Chicago Bulls, leading the Bulls to a 255-139 record (.647) over five seasons from 2010-15. Under his tutelage, the Bulls reached the playoffs in all five seasons, including holding the best record in the NBA in both of his first two seasons (2010-12).

Thibodeau has also coached for the Minnesota Timberwolves (1989-91), the San Antonio Spurs (1992-94), the Philadelphia 76ers (1994-96), the New York Knicks (1996-2003) and the Houston Rockets (2003-07). He spent the 1991-92 season as an advance scout with the Seattle SuperSonics. While serving as an assistant coach in the NBA, he worked under Bill Musselman, Jerry Tarkanian, John Lucas, Jeff Van Gundy, Don Chaney and Doc Rivers.

He was a four-year letter winner in basketball at Salem State University (Salem, Mass.), team captain his senior season, and a member of back-to-back MASCAC Conference Champion squads in 1980 and 1981 (the first two basketball teams in school history to qualify for the Division III NCAA Tournament). In 1981, upon completion of his collegiate career, he took his first coaching job as an assistant on the Vikings' staff. Following three years as an assistant, he was promoted to head coach at Salem State University, a position he held for one season.

in 1985, he was hired as an assistant coach at Harvard University, where he spent four seasons on campus, before accepting a spot on Bill Musselman's coaching staff with the expansion Minnesota Timberwolves in 1989.

Thibodeau holds bachelor's and master's degrees in counseling from Salem State University. He was inducted into the New Britain Sports Hall of Fame in 1998.

Stan Van Gundy has completed two seasons as president of basketball operations and head coach for the Detroit Pistons, after being named to the positions on May 14, 2014.

After a 32-50 record in his first season, Van Gundy led the Pistons to a 44-38 record in 2015-16 (a 12-game improvement), leading Detroit to its first above-.500 record since 2007-08 and first postseason appearance since the 2008-09 season. It was Van Gundy's eighth playoff appearance in 10 seasons as a head coach and also his eighth season finishing with a better than .500 record.

In addition to his coaching duties, Van Gundy oversees all aspects of the basketball operations department.

Van Gundy holds a career coaching record of 447-296 (.602) in nine-plus NBA seasons. He's taken his teams to the postseason eight times and holds a 48-39 (.552) playoff record with the Miami Heat and Orlando Magic. Prior to Detroit, he last coached in the NBA during the 2011-12 season when he led the Magic to a 37-29 record and a fifth consecutive postseason appearance. He compiled a 259-135 (.657) regular-season record with the Magic from 2007-12 and captured three consecutive Southeast Division titles from 2007-10.

Van Gundy spent 12 years with the Heat, arriving prior to the 1995-96 campaign and served as assistant coach under Pat Riley for two seasons. He was elevated to assistant head coach in 1997, a position he held for six seasons. Van Gundy was the team's lead assistant until being named head coach on Oct. 24, 2003.

Prior to his tenure with Miami, Van Gundy coached at the University of Wisconsin for three seasons, including head coach in 1994-95. He began his coaching career as an assistant at the University of Vermont from 1981-83, then served as head coach at Castleton State College in Vermont from 1983-86. After stints as an assistant coach at Canisius College (1986-87) and Fordham (1987-88), he was head coach at the University of Massachusetts-Lowell from 1988-92. In eight years as a college head coach, Van Gundy compiled a record of 135-92 (.595).

A native of Indio, Calif., Van Gundy earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and a Bachelor of Science in physical education from SUNY-Brockport in 1981. While at SUNY-Brockport, Van Gundy played basketball for his father, Bill. His brother, Jeff, was a head coach in the NBA for 11 seasons, most recently with the Houston Rockets from 2003-07. Stan and his wife, Kim, have four children.

Frank Vogel became the 13th head coach in Orlando Magic history on May 20, 2016.

During his five-plus seasons as a head coach with Indiana from 2011-16, Vogel guided the Pacers to the NBA playoffs five times, two Central Division championships and two trips to the Eastern Conference Finals. He has an overall NBA regular-season head-coaching record of 250-181 (.580). His 250 wins are the most for a Pacers head coach in the team's NBA history.

On Jan. 30, 2011, Vogel took over for Jim O'Brien and led Indiana to a 20-18 record and its first playoff berth in four seasons. After falling to Chicago, the team with the NBA's best regular-season record, during the first round of the playoffs, he had his interim tag removed on July 6, 2011.

During the 2011-12 season, Vogel guided the Pacers to a 42-24 record (.636), the fifth-best record in the NBA, and finished third in voting for NBA Coach of the Year. During the playoffs, the Pacers defeated Orlando in the first round before falling to eventual NBA champion Miami in the Eastern Conference Semifinals.

In 2012-13, Indiana went 49-32 (.605) and captured the Central Division title for the first time since 2003-04. During the postseason, the Pacers defeated Atlanta and New York to reach the Eastern Conference Finals, where they lost in seven games to Miami, which again went on to win the NBA title.

During the 2013-14 campaign, Indiana spent most of the regular season with the best record in the NBA. The Pacers finished 56-26 (.683), won their second straight Central Division crown and were the No. 1 seed in the Eastern Conference. The 56 wins were the third most in the franchise's NBA history. Indiana beat Atlanta and Washington before losing again to Miami during the Eastern Conference Finals. Vogel and his staff also earned coaching honors for the East during the 2014 NBA All-Star Game.

After missing the postseason in 2014-15, mostly due to a team ravaged by injuries (including the 76 games missed by NBA All-Star Paul George), Vogel and Indiana rebounded last season and posted a 45-37 record (.549). He was named the NBA's Eastern Conference Coach of the Month for the fourth time during his career in April 2016, after the Pacers went 6-1 during the month and secured the seventh seed in the East. Indiana lost to Toronto in the first round.

Vogel, who is in his 20th season in the NBA, began his NBA career as the head video coordinator with Boston under Rick Pitino. He stayed in that role from 1997-2001 before being named an assistant coach with the Celtics under O'Brien. Vogel was also as an assistant coach under O'Brien in Philadelphia in 2004-05 and in Indiana for three-plus seasons (2007-11). He also served as an advanced scout for the Los Angeles Lakers (2005-06) and Washington (2006-07).

Luke Walton was hired as the 26th head coach in Lakers history, and the 22nd in the Los Angeles era, on April 29, 2016. The 36-year-old joins George Mikan, Jim Pollard, Jerry West, Pat Riley, Magic Johnson, Kurt Rambis, and Byron Scott as the eighth individual to both play and coach for the organization.

Walton rejoins the Lakers family after spending two seasons as an assistant coach on Steve Kerr's staff with the Golden State Warriors. In his two years in Golden State, the team appeared in consecutive NBA Finals and won the 2015 NBA championship. Stepping into the interim head coaching position for Kerr, who was forced to take a medical leave of absence from the team, to begin the 2015-16 campaign, Walton oversaw a 39-4 start to the season that included winning the first 24 consecutive games of the year, an NBA record. The team's 73-9 regular-season record stands as the best mark in NBA history.

Prior to his time with the Warriors, Walton served as a player development coach for the Los Angeles D-Fenders of the National Basketball Development League during the 2013-14 season. He began his formal experience in the coaching realm during the 2011 NBA lockout, when he served as an assistant coach at the University of Memphis.

The San Diego native enjoyed a 10-year NBA playing career (2003-13) with the Lakers and the Cleveland Cavaliers, and was an integral part of Los Angeles' NBA championship teams in 2009 and 2010. Originally selected with the 32nd overall pick in the 2003 NBA Draft, Walton averaged 4.7 points, 2.8 rebounds, and 2.3 assists in 564 regular season games (138 starts). He made the postseason seven times (all with the Lakers), logging 88 postseason appearances (12 starts), and represented Los Angeles in the Shooting Stars Competition at the 2005 All-Star Weekend.

Walton played collegiately at the University of Arizona for Hall of Fame coach Lute Olson, leaving the Pac-10 as one of only three players in conference history to tally 1,000 career points, 500 rebounds and 500 assists. He was named an All-Pac-10 performer twice in his four-year career (1999-2003), and was a Wooden Award Finalist as a senior. His best statistical season came as a junior, where he posted averages of 15.7 points, 7.3 rebounds and 6.3 assists, earning his selection to four All-America teams, including being one of 10 players to receive John R. Wooden Award All-American honors.

Walton's father, Bill, is a member of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and was named one of the NBA's 50 Greatest Players. The father/son duo is the only pair in NBA history to both win multiple NBA titles. Walton's three brothers (Nate, Adam, and Chris) all played basketball in college, and he cites his mother, Susie, as the person he most admires for raising four boys.

Luke and his wife, Bre, whom he met at Arizona where she was a standout volleyball player, have two children: son Lawson and daughter Landen.

Earl Watson was named interim head coach on Feb. 1, 2016, then retained as the 17th head coach in Phoenix Suns franchise history on April 19, 2016.

Watson, the second-youngest head coach in the NBA at 37 years old, went 9-24 in 33 games as interim head coach after first joining the organization as an assistant coach in the summer of 2015. In his 33-game tenure, the Suns averaged the second-most rebounds in the NBA and were one of the league's most improved defensive teams over the season's final month as they closed the season with wins in three of their final four games. Prior to joining the Suns' coaching staff, Watson spent one season as an assistant coach for the Austin Spurs of the NBA Development League after his professional playing career came to an end following the 2013-14 season.

A four-year starter for UCLA (1997-2001), Watson displayed the leadership he would exude throughout his career as he guided the team to three Sweet 16 appearances in the NCAA tournament and remains the prestigious program's all-time leader in steals (235) and minutes played (4,371).

Following his success at UCLA, Watson was selected 40th overall in the 2001 NBA Draft by Seattle as his basketball education extended into his professional career. As a rookie, Hall of Fame point guard Gary Payton mentored Watson with the SuperSonics, before he played the next three seasons in Memphis. With the Grizzlies, Watson played for coaching luminaries Hubie Brown, who was NBA Coach of the Year in 2003-04, and Mike Fratello under the direction of the team's general manager, the iconic Jerry West, who signed Watson in 2002.

Watson's career continued in Denver under George Karl before he returned to Seattle where he played for Bob Hill, P.J. Carlesimo and Scott Brooks as he moved with the team to Oklahoma City. With the SuperSonics in 2007-08, Watson averaged career highs of 10.7 points and 6.8 assists, starting in 73 of his 78 appearances. Prior to the 2009-10 season, Watson signed with Indiana, where the team's president of basketball operations and basketball legend Larry Bird encouraged his potential in coaching. Watson spent three seasons with Utah from 2010-13, playing for head coach Jerry Sloan in 2010-11 in the final season of the Hall of Famer's career.

By the time Watson reached Portland in 2013-14, his career had come full circle: from rookie pupil to bench contributor to regular starter to veteran teacher to mentor. In his final professional season with the Trail Blazers, Watson was a coach in uniform helping the development of rising stars Damian Lillard and C.J. McCollum, playing the role of adviser that some of the most distinguished names and minds in basketball history had played with him. For his career, Watson played in 878 games over 13 seasons, averaging 6.4 points, 4.4 assists and 1.0 steals.

A native of Kansas City, Kan., and 1997 graduate of Washington High School, where he led the Wildcats to their first league title since 1975, the former Kansas City Kansan Player of the Year is still very much revered in his hometown; the building that housed the elementary school Watson attended is now a preschool named the Earl Watson Early Childhood Center.
